Skywatchers of Ancient Cahokia by William Isominger

William Iseminger Cahokia Mounds State Historic Site

William Iseminger of Cahokia Mounds State Historic Site, will be featured at the June meeting of the St. Louis Astronomical Society. The meeting will begin at 7:30 PM Friday, June 19, in McDonnell Hall, Room 162, on the Washington University campus.

The Cahokia Mounds State Historic Site, just 15 minutes east of Saint Louis, is the location of a Native American city that flourished from 600 A.D. to 1100 A.D. The Site preserves the remains of about 80 earthen mounds out of the 120 mounds constructed in the city. The Cahokia tribe included ancient astronomers who discovered much about the

movements of the Sun, Moon, and stars centuries before the European invention of the telescope. They constructed a "Woodhenge" of upright logs, positioned to mark the changing of the seasons and the motion of the Moon. Mr. Iseminger will talk about the astronomy of the Mound City builders and about how the Historic Site and its Interpretive Center tell the story of this vanished civilization and its great city.

William Iseminger is the Assistant Site Manager for the Cahokia Mounds State Historic Site. He holds a Bachelor's degree from the University of Oklahoma and a Master's degree from SIU-Carbondale, in anthropology. A participant in excavations of Native American sites in South Dakota and Illinois, Mr. Iseminger is author of a recent book Cahokia Mounds, America's First City.

FOR SALE Starter Eyepiece Kit


We have a surplus of eyepieces left over from the Library Telescope Program. These eyepieces were the original ones that came with the Orion Starblast Telecopes. We removed these eyepieces from the telescope and replaced them with a single zoom eyepiece. We have bundled the 2 eyepieces along with a collimating tool into a plastic case as an eyepiece starter kit. If you are a beginner this might be a good starting point for you. If you are an experienced observer, these eyepieces are an inexpensive alternative for public viewing, solar projection and other activities.

The cost for one starter kit is \$15. You can buy 2 or more kits for only \$10 each. Each kit comes with an Orion 6mm and 17mm eyepiece, a collimating tool and a plastic storage case. We will be selling the kits, while supplies

last, at our monthly meetings. All proceeds of the sale will go to the Library telescope Program Fund for future purchases. See photo below (left to right plastic case, 17mm eyepiece, collimating tool, 6mm eyepiece, screw on lid for plastic case.

Library Loaner Telescope Checkout Procedure

Greetings once again from the Borg Collective. In the first article, we announced the naming contest for the LPT. We thought it might be useful to announce the procedures on how to check one out. They are listed below.

Requirements for borrowing a SLAS owned telescope.

- 30-day limit.
- Member in good standing (dues current and 18 years of age and over) and membership in force for the period during which the equipment is held. As verified by Treasurer.
- Copy of driver's license as verification of current address.
- SLAS equipment manager and Borrower complete the "Loaner Telescope Agreement" and borrower submits a refundable deposit of \$75.00.
- Check deposited and held in SLAS account until such time as the telescope is returned to equipment manager and condition of equipment is verified.
- The borrower is not to attempt to collimate or adjust the optics in any manner.
- Borrowers must pick-up from and deliver the equipment to the equipment manager.
- Advance notice of 24 hours required.
- After equipment is inspected and found to be in good order, the equipment manager will authorize a deposit refund to be sent by the treasurer to the borrower.
- If the equipment is not returned in the condition in which it was loaner with the exception of reasonable wear and tear, then the member has the right to appeal any assessment of repair or replacement to the Board of Directors of the St Louis Astronomical Society.

Neil deGrasse Tyson at the Peabody by Eric Kovach

As the winner of the raffle, I was able to attend the Neil deGrasse Tyson lecture on May 13th at the Peabody Opera House (the Kiel for Brad!) The event was sold out and his topic for the evening was "Science as a Way of Knowing." He spoke for two and a half hours and had time for some questions from the audience.

Dr. Tyson started off with a basic review of the scientific method including a review of hypotheses and theories and how the media can misuse this nomenclature. He discussed the cultural, political and sociological observations of the use and misuse of science. He also showed a few of the latest pictures of Mars and Pluto. As you would guess, he was pretty thorough on all of the reasons why Pluto was not a planet. He often reminded the hecklers in the audience to "Get over it!" Pluto is not a planet.

The highlight for me was when he showed a recent picture of Earth from Cassini's perspective near Saturn, similar to Voyager's picture, and read an excerpt from Carl Sagan's Pale Blue Dot. Also, I found it interesting during





the Q & A, when asked if he could talk to anyone, alive or dead, who it would be and what they would talk about. He answered Isaac Newton because he is the father of modern science and he also wanted to run a few current problems by him!

Neil deGrasse Tyson did a very good job of inspiring and motivating the next generation to be involved in the sciences. An overall theme was to encourage thinking and how science effects future generations. Thank you S.L.A.S. and Brad Waller for offering this raffle. 


Who We Are and What We Do
