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Pluto and Beyond – Looking to New Horizons by Dr. William B. McKinnon

Washington University

Dr. William B. McKinnon will be featured at the November meeting of the St. Louis Astronomical Society. The meeting will begin at 7:30 PM Friday, November 17, in McDonnell Hall, Room 162, on the Washington University campus, Saint Louis, MO 63130.

When NASA's New Horizons spacecraft flew past Pluto on July 14, 2015, it provided the first detailed look at the distant ice world. Scientists had hoped for more than images of a cratered surface, but did not know what to expect. They were astounded at views of strange surface features – mountains of supercold ice, glaciers of frozen nitrogen, landscapes of natural gas ice. Following the frenetic activity of the days of closest approach and recession, the New Horizons spacecraft

was placed into hibernation as it coasted outward. It is now heading for an even more distant and much smaller object. Dr. McKinnon will talk about the discoveries already made from the images and data of the Pluto fly-by and comment about its next target, the icy 2014 MU69.

Dr. McKinnon is a Professor of Earth and Planetary Sciences at Washington University. His research focuses on the ice worlds, including Pluto, that lie beyond the orbit of Neptune; icy satellites of the outer solar system; and the physics of impact cratering. Dr. McKinnon is a deputy scientist and coinvestigator for the Geology, Geophysics, and Imaging Team of the New Horizons mission.

Assumption Summary – 2018 St. Louis Astronomical Society Annual Budget

Work began on the 2017 budget after the financial close for August 2017. The year to date information is therefore through August 31, 2017 with an estimated projection of activity from September 1, 2017 through December 31, 2017.

The budget information was assembled partially based on assumptions developed from the August 2017 year to date actual in areas such as membership information available at that time. The balances of the budgetary items were prepared on a line by line basis by the individual committees and committee chairpersons.

Revenue / Income:

The primary source of Revenue for the Society stems from membership fees that are assessed on an annual basis that is based on the member's individual anniversary date. The current fee structure was adopted in 2004 where the "Family Membership" was created and set at an annual rate of \$40.00 per year. At the same time, the fees for the Youth membership were decreased from \$15.00 to \$10.00

The total revenue from the membership fees for 2017 is based on:

Regular (Adult) Memberships	108 @ \$25.00/year	\$2,700
Youth Memberships	11 @ \$10.00/year	110
Family Memberships	29@ \$40.00/year	1,160

As indicated in the budget, this will provide operating revenues in the total of \$3,970 for 2018. The actual revenues that will be realized during the calendar year may be numbers.

Events

The Homemade Fest budget remains \$100. This budget is primarily used to purchase refreshments, plates, plastic ware and door prizes. SLAS hopes to continue getting the meeting room free of charge from the Science Center or the Kirkwood Community Center. Kirkwood waived the fee in 2017 because of our hosting telescope viewing at Kirkwood Park at least twice a year.

The Star-B-Que has been increased from \$175 to \$200 to account for the increased cost of meat. This event will again be member pot luck with SLAS providing the meat, paper goods, and trivia quiz prizes. SLAS hopes to continue getting the picnic pavilion free of charge. This is normally an \$80 charge, but Babler has waived the fee because of our hosting Night Skies Over Babler twice a year.

The members in attendance will be asked to provide items as with the Homemade Fest to complement the main course provided by SLAS. This will require that the membership provide their RSVP and number of attendees so the event can be planned accordingly.

Library Telescope Program:

The SLAS Library Telescope program's was launched into the St. Louis area on November 2014. In just three years, the program has grown to one of the largest and most successful programs in the country. On all fronts, the library telescope program is demonstrating success.

Membership Initiatives:

SLAS regularly holds "Welcome Aboard" meetings for new SLAS members. These meetings take place before the Monthly Meeting. New SLAS Members are given a SLAS Informational Folder containing information about SLAS resources and other related Astronomy topics.

Membership Initiatives, as in recent years, plans to hold raffle events during 2018 as opportunities arise. Past raffles involve tickets to special speaker events such as when Neil deGrasse Tyson and Jim Lovell came to the area. Membership Initiative also intends to continue the practice of awarding attendance and other prizes to the membership. Examples of some of possible prizes for 2018 include sponsoring a membership to McDonald Observatory, telescope eyepieces, and cell phone adapters for telescopes. Please feel free to suggest your ideas for membership prizes to Brad Waller at vicepresident@slasonline.org.

Membership Recognition:

The membership recognition budget for 2017 is \$300. This will include \$100 for Night Sky Network pins and certificates. The remaining \$200 will be budgeted for recognition of members for continuous membership in SLAS and for contributing time for other SLAS functions. A membership recognition committee was formed last year and an email address, recognition@slasonline.org was set up so that recommendations can be submitted to the committee. During 2016, the committee made name badges to help members identify and socialize with other members. Continuous membership pins and certificates will be awarded annually in the month of October for 5, 10, 15, 20, 25 and 30 or more years of continuous membership in SLAS. In the initial ceremony on 10/20/17, 92 pins were awarded and for 2018, we expect to award 22 more.

Merchandise:

A budget of \$45 has been established to cover the setup fees for embroidery/silkscreen. Several local retailers are being considered based on overall price, quality, and convenience.

Library:

Library expenses for 2018 will be for the purpose of purchasing the latest CDs available for both Sky & Telescope and Astronomy Magazine and the RASC Handbook at an estimated cost of \$100. The remaining budget is for the purchase of books and materials of interest to the SLAS membership.

Loaner Scope Program:

We need cases to protect some of our telescopes. We have 2 Celestron 4 inch f9.8 refractors that need a protective soft case. We have two PST solar telescopes that are still in their original boxes and need a case. We also want to have three eyepiece kits to put together to allow members to

SLAS also added four "Library Telescopes" to its inventory for the exclusive use of SLAS members during 2015. These scopes are available for checkout at the monthly general meeting. Vice President Bradley Waller is in charge of checking out the "Library Telescopes" to members.

SLAS Brochures:

Brochure printing expense was been combined with the newsletter printing expense starting with the 2015. The brochures contain information about the Society that is distributed to the general public at all outreach events. There are plans to revise and modernize the SLAS brochure for Brochure paper requirements are estimated at 15 reams of "astro-bright" premium paper at a cost of \$150. In addition to the brochures, the Board is in the process of developing new alternative handouts for star parties and other events, such a business card style and/or "quarter card" style handouts that will provide key information about SLAS, including information on SLAS's social media sites and on how to join SLAS.

Summary:

The Board and participating committee members have increased several budget items in anticipation of increased interest following the 2017 Eclipse as well as continued high volume of star parties and related public event associated with the Library Telescope program. The budget for SLAS's loaner scope program has been expanded to purchase much needed cases and accessories and to make SLAS's fine collection of loaner scopes more visible and accessible to the membership. The budget for speakers has been retained at the 2017 level in order to attract quality speakers from a larger radius and to sport the participation of graduate students. Similar to 2017, funding for the Library Telescope Escrow have been categorized as an investment and will be recorded as below-the-line (other) expenses. The net result is 2017 budget as presented equals a net loss from operations of \$2,600 for 2018, compared a net loss of \$1,940 for the 2017 budget and a net loss of \$1,060 for the 2016 budget. Meeting the projected expenses for the upcoming year will require supplementing the operations from cash reserves to the extent donations and other revenue sources do not make up the shortfall. The below the line expenses for the Library Telescope Escrow total \$500. All attempts have been made during this process to continue to provide valued programs for the membership.

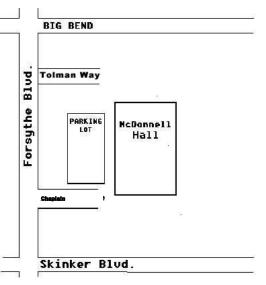


Who We Are and What We Do
